



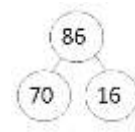

Lesson 1

- Online activity: Part-whole relationships and fact families
- Offline activity: Part-whole models and fact families: Remind yourself what a part-whole model looks like showing 86 as 8 tens and 6 ones. Now try partitioning **38**, **64** and **58** into tens and ones using a part whole model. Is this the only way these numbers can be partitioned?

Take a look at this part-whole model.



Can you partition 86 any other ways?

Lesson 2

- Online activity: Comparing $a + b > c + c$
- Offline activity: Look at the following number sentences and decide which total is greater or less than the other using the symbols: less than $<$ greater than $>$ and equal to $=$. The first one has been done for you.

Lesson 3

- Online activity: Related facts
- Offline activity: Tommy starts writing a pattern. Continue his pattern.

$$1 + 9 = 10$$

$$3 + 7 = 10$$

Then he starts writing a related pattern. Continue his pattern.

$$10 + 90 = 100$$

Lesson 1

- Online Activity: Using phonics to develop vocabulary about the UK
- Offline Activity: Look at the words associated with the UK. Can you identify the phonemes (sounds) in them? For example, the word 'city' has 4 phonemes. **Dorset Coast Scotland Queen England**

Lesson 2

- Online Activity: Using commas in lists when writing statements.
- Offline Activity: We use commas to separate items in a list in our writing. Before the last item we use the conjunction 'and'. Look at the following list to show you:

I went to the shop and bought an apple, two bananas and an orange.

Now make 3 of your own lists using commas.

Challenge: Check these sentences to see if commas in a list have been used correctly. Can you put the comma in the right place and write the sentence correctly?

*In the garden I saw a snail flowers, leaves and a worm.
I coloured in my picture with a blue and white, pink, yellow crayon.
A monkey has round, eyes, brown fur and a useful and tail.*

Lesson 3

- Online Activity: Using long ladder letters in your writing (l t i u j y)
- Offline Activity: Practise writing the long ladder letters using a cursive script. Can you think of some words that have these letters in them? Here are a few examples: little, juicy and jump. Make a thought bubble with your words then put some into sentences.
- Offline Activity: Fill a sandwich bag with soap, foam or paint and practice letter formation. Remember to seal your sandwich bag securely! You can even tape the bag onto a wall or window to practice forming your long ladder letters. Remember to use the handwriting phrases to help you (i.e. Up we go...down the insect ... and off we go... dot for the

head). After practising your letters, write common exception words that include these letters. You could write them on the ground with chalk or in a special notebook.

Lesson 4

- Online Activity: Creating questions correctly using question marks
- Offline Activity: Hot Seating - Take it in turns to be a different character (you could be a character from your favourite storybook or a non-fiction character that you have learnt about) and take the 'hot seat' in role. Ask a family member from your household to ask you questions. Remember to remain in character the whole time you are in the hot seat and answer the questions as fully as you can. Now it is your time to ask the questions. Write the questions down before asking them and remember to use those all important question words (what, where, when, why, how etc.). You could ask to video call a family member or friend to do this activity.


Lesson 5

- Online Activity: Reading lesson - Cyril and Pat by Emily Gravett
- Offline Activity: Read part of a book to someone at home.

What is your favourite word or phrase from the book? Explain why.

If you could ask the author a question, what would it be?

Draw a picture of a character or object from the book and label what you know about it. Use the text to help you.
