

2-D Shapes

A **2-D shape** is sometimes called a **flat shape**. Here are the most common 2-D shapes.



If you look at each of them, they all have different properties. Properties are special features of that shape that allow it to be described.




A **vertice** is where two edges of a shape meet (this is another word for corner). How many **edges** does each shape have? How many vertices does each shape have?

What 2-D shape is being described here? This shape has four straight sides and four corners. It has two short sides and two long sides.






