### Lesson 1

- Online activity: Finding a quarter of an amount
- Offline activity: Finding a quarter of an amount is like sharing the amount equally between four people and seeing how much each person gets. For example, if you have 8 cars and you share them equally between 4 people, each person would get 2 cars. We write a quarter like this 1/4. The 4 at the bottom (the denominator) shows the number is divided into four groups and the 1 at the top (the numerator) shows that we need to know how many are in one of the groups. So 1/4 of 8 = 2Try working out a quarter of these amounts. If you get stuck, use counters or other objects to help. Divide them into four equal groups and count one group.



- Online activity: Temperature
- Offline activity:

Temperature is measured in degrees Celsius (°C). Water freezes at 0°C and boils at 100°C. If you have a thermometer at home, you could try putting it in warm water and cold water and seeing what temperature it reads in each one. If it's an electronic thermometer, ask if you can find out the temperatures of different members of your family.


Try reading the temperature on these thermometers.



Fascinating fact: Water boils at lower temperatures at the top of mountains. At the top of Mount Everest, water boils at around 70°C. This is because the air pressure is lower.

Remember that when the minute hand (the long hand) is on 12 it is something o'clock. The hour hand (short hand) tells you what o'clock it is. When the minute hand is on 6, it is half past the hour. Look at which hour the hour hand has just gone past to find out which hour it is half past

Pat is organising her teddy bears. She donates  $\frac{1}{4}$  of them to charity. How many bears did she have left?








